hence we occupied a premier position to welcome the arrival of the Mustang, Spitfire and Kitty Hawk, lining up to pay homage to their dominance of the skies. The public arrived to be greeted by eleven magnificent Morgans, resplendent with their owners now in brilliant sunshine. Period costumes stood out from the crowd as spectators jostled to inspect the Morgans. Among the 400 show vehicles on site, owners feverously polished and preened their chargers for concourse judging.







Then the aircraft arrived. A Supermarine Spitfire Mark 1A X 4009, originally flown by Flight Lieutenant Pat Hughes, Australia's highest awarded fighter ace in the Battle of Britain. A P40 Kitty Hawk and a P51 Mustang, all important in their own right. Tethered by steel draw bars, they were carefully manoeuvred into the Aerotek Hanger, after closely passing by the Morgans, parked as a guard of honour.









